MACHINE 2017 CUB CADET **Versatile New** Utility UTVs from Cub Cadet GHATHER 550 & 750


ou might know the Cub Cadet name by virtue of their line of rugged and reliable lawn mowers and tractors. But did you know that this American company has expanded its reach into the utility UTV marketplace? Cub Cadet started out with a single vehicle in their lineup, named the "Volunteer". After several years of R&D and successful sales with the Volunteer, Cub Cadet introduced the "Challenger" lineup of vehicles. With this introduction, Cub Cadet has a healthy lineup of 10 UTV's total. For the 2017 model year, the Challenger 550 and 750 models are all-new, and we recently enjoyed the opportunity to drive these new utility-based UTV's.

Cub Cadet recently invited us out to the launch of these two new utility vehicles at a ride event located about 60 miles north of Los Angeles, CA. Known as Hungry Valley SVRA park, this Southern California based ride spot includes some 130 miles of marked trails for off-road recreation and exploration.

More Vehicles, More Fun!

These latest Challenger 550 and 750 vehicles from Cub Cadet are designed to give consumers access to more power, more versatility, and even more options for customization straight from the factory. In all, the Cub Cadet Challenger lineup features the following vehicles:

- ► Challenger 400 (Base and LX editions, 404cc OHV engine, 50" width)
- ► Challenger 500 (471cc engine, many standard accessories included, 64" width)
- ► NEW Challenger 550 (Regular and Camo editions, 546cc EFI liquid cooled engine)
- ► NEW Challenger 750 (735cc EFI, liquid cooled engine)
- ► Challenger 750 Crew

Feature Rich

Both of these new 2WD/4WD gearbox. Challenger models include an automotive-style cockpit with full doors that offer abundant protection from the elements, whether you are tackling muddy terrain or are in a treelined forest environment. Drivers will also enjoy the standard tilt steering wheel, open storage built into the dash, and an opening glove box to house extra gloves and small tools. Both Challenger

EFI models also come with sculpted bucket seats, threeway adjustable suspension on all four corners, and a fully automatic CVT on-demand

From the outside, you will notice that the cab design includes standard features. such as sleek headlights, a full roof, sealed Rollover Protection Structure (ROPS) cab frame, and a full windshield.

models can be completely weather-sealed in minutes. with the quick addition of Cub Cadet accessories, including the optional upper doors and a rear window. Nice touch.

The rear mounting rack and accessory rack tubes save cargo bed space while enabling many more accessory-mounting possibilities, including a gun boot, chainsaw boot, and a spare tire mount.

"Customization of utility vehicles is extremely important according to the customers we continually talk with," said Tom Mielke, UTV Product Marketing Manager at Cub Cadet. "We've designed the Challenger Series with exclusive features that give owners the power to customize their utility vehicle for the challenges they face

New Rear Cargo Bed & Attachments

The cargo bed on both the Challenger 550 and 750 models measures out to be 34" L x 46" W x 11" H. kits or other aftermarket. They have an innovative set of integrated attach-Both new Challenger ment points, also known as "T" slots. These T-slots help secure purpose-built accessories offered in the Cub Cadet accessory line. The vertical slots in the bed accept standard 3/4-inch plywood for partitions. The bed boasts a 500-pound cargo capacity for hauling everything from firewood, to any results from a hunting or fishing expedition.

Motor City

The Challenger 550 comes with a 546cc Electronic Fuel Injected (EFI), liquid-cooled engine, which is rated at 27.5 horsepower. The Challenger 750 features a 35.8 horsepower 735cc EFI, liquid-cooled engine. Both machines feature a 7.6 gallon fuel tank for a good amount of fuel range.

With a wheelbase of 76.75 inches and a towing capacity of 1200 lbs. each (along with 500 lb. cargo bed capacity) these units are hardworking and versatile for a variety of uses. Also, the dump bed lifts on either side for quick unloads.

Ground clearance is ample at 12 inches, and the selectable locking front and rear differentials give the machines a good amount of traction for any traction situation. Both models are available in Cub Yellow, Blue, Red, Black and Camo (Camo

All Cub Cadet models are available through Cub Cadet's Independent Retailers, which included the new Cub Cadet Challenger 550 and 750 models. Price-wise, you are looking at anywhere from \$5999.99 for the entry level Challenger 400 all the way to \$21,999.99 for the Volunteer WT CAB.

Retail prices on the new Challenger EFI 550 are \$9999.99, with the new Challenger EFI 750 going for a suggested retail price of \$11299.99.
